Session 1	Visit to the Dinosaur Dome.	Rhyme - Recap on what rhyme is. Adult to hold up 2 cards and ask if they rhyme? E.g. dog and pen, if not can they think of another that rhymes. Put all the cards out in the middle of the carpet face down and invite children to choose 2, turn them over, say them out loud and say if they rhyme or not. Repeat and note any children or rhyming stems that they find trickier.	Talk about special people who helped us to understand about dinosaurs. Mary Anning - fossil hunter Robert Owen - came up with the name dinosaur. How are these people important to what we know about dinosaurs. Recap on fossils and talk about how Mary Anning helped us to find out what they date through coprilites (fossilized poos) that she found.	Maths – Pattern – making spatial patterns to make butterflies. Talk about the shapes being used and if they are the same.	Butterflies – Have a look at the butterfly net and recap on the life cycle. Have pictures and ask children to sequence them. Ask children to practice saying the vocabulary and look at the butterflies in the net. How have they changed since being a caterpillar?
